Monarchs:

King George IV (1762-1830)

Statesmen:

Edmund Burke (1729-1797) – Irish statesman, author and political theorist

Writers:

Robert Burns (1759-1796) – Scottish poet and lyricist

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle (1859-1930) – Scottish physician and writer of Sherlock Holmes

Rudyard Kipling (1865-1907) - English short story writer and poet, penned The Jungle Book

Alexander Pope (1688-1744) - English satirist and poet

Sir Walter Scott (1771-1832) - Scottish historical novelist, poet and playwright

Actors:

David Garrick (1717-1779) - English actor, playwright, theatre manager and producer

Sir Henry Irving (1838-1905) – English stage actor

Peter Sellers (1925-1980) – British film actor, comedian and singer

Entertainers:

Cyril Fletcher (1913-2005) - English comedian, famous for his role in television show That's life!

Nat Jackley (1909-1988) - English comic actor who often played pantomime dames

Sir Harry Lauder (1870-1950) Scottish entertainer - "Scotland's greatest ever ambassador!"

David Nixon (1919-1978) TV personality and British magician

Music:

Thomas Arne (1710-1778) – British composer who penned Rule Britannia!

Samuel Wesley (1766-1837) - English organist and composer

Sir Henry Bishop (1786-1855) – English composer who penned Home! Sweet Home!

Sir Arthur Sullivan (1842-1900) - English composer who worked alongside dramatist W.S.Gilbert on 14 operatic collaborations

Artists:

Sir James Thornhill (1676-1734) – English painter of historical subjects

William Hogarth (1697-1764) - English painter and social critic

Sir John Soane (1753-1857) - English Neo-Classical architect

Explorers:

Sir Richard Burton (1821-1890) – British geographic explorer

Captain Robert Falcon Scott (1868-1912) – Royal Navy officer and explorer

Statesmen:

Sir Winston Churchill (1874-1965) - British Prime Minister

Cecil Rhodes (1852-1903) – Founder of the southern African territory of Rhodesia

Scientists:

Dr Edward Jenner (1749-1823) - English physician and scientist - discovered smallpox vaccine

Sir Alexander Fleming (1881-1955) – Scottish biologist, pharmacologist and botanist

Sir Joseph Banks (1744-1820) – English botanist who took part in Captain James Cook's 1st voyage

Notable servicemen:

FM 1st Duke of Wellington (1769-1852) – Anglo-Irish soldier and statesman

FM Garnett 1st Viscount Wolseley (1883-1913) – Anglo-Irish officer so notorious for his efficiency it led to the common phrase "everything's all Sir Garnet"

Gen Sir Francis Wingate (1861-1953) - British General and administrator in Egypt and the Sudan

Sport:

(Michael) Colin Cowdrey, Baron Cowdrey (1932-2000) Cricket

- For England, he was the first cricketer to play in 100 test matches

(Thomas) Mervyn Davies (1946-2012) Rugby

- "Merv the Swerve", a Welsh rugby union player who won 38 caps for Wales

Eric Westwood Fiddian (1910-1995) Golf

- English amateur champion. Fiddian once made two holes-in-one in the same round

Sir Stanley Matthews (1915-2000) Football

- Played for England 54 times

Ronald ("Ron") Greenwood (1921-2006) Football

- A player and subsequently manager of West Ham and England

More recent figures, both here and in the United States of America, that have publicly announced their membership of the organisation include:

Harry Houdini (1874-1926) – American stunt performer, notorious for his escape acts

Nat King Cole (1919-1965) – American jazz musician

Bob Monkhouse (1928-2003) - British comedy writer, comedian, actor and presenter

Jesse Jackson (b.1941) – American civil rights activist

Rick Wakeman (b.1949) – English keyboard player, composer and songwriter

Phil Collins (b.1951) – English singer-songwriter, drummer, pianist and actor
